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Center faculty member discusses the evolving opioid crisis and what we can do to help

"In 2017 alone, 47,600 Americans died from opioid overdoses. That's 130 people every day.

The rate of opioid prescriptions has dropped steadily since 2012, but it is still at 59 prescriptions per 100 Americans, which means 191 million prescriptions, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"We need to reframe our mindset in understanding addiction," says <u>Alyssa Peckham</u>, a clinical assistant professor in Northeastern's Bouvé College of Health Sciences. "It's a chronic illness, rather than a moral failure." Read more at News@Northeastern

Center faculty member awarded funding to study incentives to reduce use of opioid medications

Alicia Modestino, Professor of Public Policy and Economics at Northeastern University, is the principal investigator for a new grant from the Abdut Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab at MIT.

The grant is for studying the impact of providing patients with enhanced education and financial incentives to reduce their use of prescribed opioid medications. Two other faculty from the Center who are joining her on the grant are professors Md. Noor Alam (Industrial Engineering) and Gary Young (School of Business and College of Health Sciences).

Professors Md. Noor Alam (Industrial Engineering), Alicia Modestino (Public Policy and Economics), and Alyssa Peckham (School of Pharmacy), and Gary Young (School of Business and College of Health Sciences) are collaborating on a new research contract from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. The contract is to conduct a mixed methods study of physicians' prescribing practices of medications to treat opioid dependence.
